Romans

Introduction (1:1-17)

Being an epistle, the introductory section is clearly stated and observed. Beginning with typical salutations, followed by a brief statement of rapport. There is, however, a transitional section, that sort of sets theme of the letter in verses 1:16-17.

The Wrath of God (1:18-3:20)

• The World is subjected to evil (1:18-32)

In this section we see that all of creation has turned away from their clear and present creator.

The fallout of such desires of our hearts resulted in grave evils.

• God's judgement is Righteous (2:1-16)

Man's own judgement on those under God's wrath condemns themselves, having contempt for God's kindness. God's judgement however, is given in righteousness, blessing to the upright, who uphold the Law, and wrath to the disobedient.

• No one is righteous through the Law (2:17-20)

Those who boasted in the law, were themselves unable to keep it, their hearts were far from God. Thus, proving that no one was righteous because they received the Law, and no one was righteous apart from it. However, the faithfulness of God still remained.

• Righteousness by faith, (3:21-31)

Jesus Christ displayed the righteousness of God through faith, to all (for all have sinned) who believe. A righteousness not based on our works, which would fail, but on Christ himself, and trust in him.

• Learning from Abraham's faith (4:1-25)

The letter then directs its listeners to consider how Abraham was credited righteous, not from the Law, or circumcision (which all occurred latter), or from works, but from faith.

• Our Blessed hope (5:1-11)

If then through the death of Christ we are reconciled, we have much more hope in his resurrection and life to be made complete with God. Even our sufferings God can use for our coming glory.

The Salvation of God (5:12-7:25)

• Grace reigns through Christ (5:12-21)

Previously we had been under the rule of sin and death. Now Christ reigns in grace and life, where there is no condemnation.

• Life in Faithful Obedience (6:1-23)

Since we no longer are under sin, we no longer should live as if we were under it. We are united with Jesus's death to sin, and his life to righteousness. Living in faithful service and obedience, knowing that sin leads to death, but God's grace leads to life.

• Christ Fulfills the Law (7:1-25)

Not only are we free from sin, but Christ's death also free's us from the condemnation given by the law, as the law does not apply to the dead. The war that waged in us from exposure to the law, being still captivated by sin and unable to accomplish it, has now been fully fulfilled by Christ.

The Love of God (8:1-8:39)

• We are now spiritual beings (8:1-17)

Righteousness brought about by Christ is now passed on to those who walk not according to the flesh, but by the Spirit of God. This spirit given to us by God to bring about righteousness, resurrection, and glory within us.

• Sanctification into glory (8:18-39)

Now we eagerly await with hope that God will redeem all present sufferings, groanings, and weaknesses for our glory. Knowing that God works all things for the good of those that love him, there is nothing that will keep us from his love.
